

Task Word	Meaning
Account	Account for: give reasons for.
Account	Account of: provide a <u>description</u> of an event or experience.
Analyse	<u>Examine</u> methodically and in detail, in order to <u>explain</u> and interpret the implications.
Apply	Use in relation to a particular scenario.
Assess/Evaluate	Make a judgement based on criteria. This will require you to give reasons based on evidence you have provided.
Compare	Estimate, measure or note the similarity or difference between.
Contrast	Highlight the difference between.
"Critically"	Often used conjunctively with terms such as <u>evaluate</u> , <u>analyse</u> .  When constructing your argument, based on evidence, consider at least two points of view. For example; you may offer the view of an established scholar and then the differing view of another scholar.  Make sure you integrate your own view into the <u>discussion</u> with an <u>explanation</u> on why you prefer that view.
Describe	Provide defining characteristics for.
Discuss	This does not require a judgement to be made.  Providing sound reason, supported by evidence, for various aspects of a topic. Usually, one view that has been put forth is elected as the correct conclusion.
Establish	Provide a firm foundation for the reasons given.
Examine	Inspect thoroughly in order to determine nature or condition.
Explain	Relate cause and effect; provide why and/or how.
Explore	Consider varying points of view in relation to the topic.
Highlight	Draw special attention to.
Justify	Provide evidence that supports the answer and <u>explain</u> why the answer and evidence are sound and reasonable. This may involve explaining why alternative views are <i>not</i> sound.
Outline	Give an overview of the main points, and draw connections between them, rather than <u>explain</u> in minute detail.
Present	Bring information to a specific audience with a particular motivation (i.e. convincing your church to sanction a new ministry or educating your friends on the meaning of Easter).
Recommend	Put forward a notion with supporting evidence as to why it should be accepted (see <u>justify</u> ).
Reflect	<u>Examine</u> the topic in light of your personal experiences.
Report	Present findings based on your research into the topic. May contain charts, tables, diagrams. Often includes a recommendation.
Review	A detailed <u>assessment</u> of the topic, where each major point is methodically considered and <u>evaluated</u> .
Summarise	Give the main facts or points in brief. Include only necessary information, and general statements.
